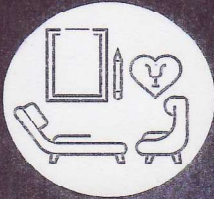


CAN SEXUAL FEELINGS CHANGE?

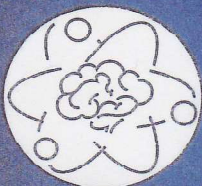
Are everyone's sexual attractions set in stone forever?



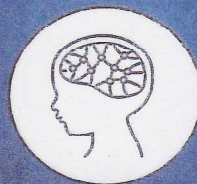
According to the American Psychological Association, a significant number of men who identify as homosexual actually admit sometimes having romantic and sexual attraction toward women.¹



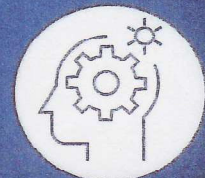
Neuroplasticity: regions of the brain that are related to sexual preference are regions that change over time, such as the thalamus and hypothalamus.
